According to the church website, St. Gregory's was founded in 1865 by a small group of Irish immigrants who had settled in North East after fleeing the potato famine. They initially gathered in a home to hold Mass and with the support of the first Bishop of Erie, built their first wooden church in 1867. Over time, the church grew along with the community. In

1925, the current brick church was built to accommodate the growing congregation. Today, the church stands as a symbol of faith and community.

"When I think about our church celebrating this double anniversary, I get choked up. I think of my family's history at this church as well as at the school. My parents, grandparents, myself, my children, and now my grandchildren receive all their sacraments at the same place. We are blessed to have such a terrific community of faith that has stood the test of time," said Lori Helffrich, lifelong parish member.

To honor the double anniversary, the church is planning ongoing celebrations throughout the year. Celebrations intend to bring the community together in both reflection and joy.

"The plan is to accentuate what we stand for as a Parish Family including faith, service to the entire community, and simply gathering together to enjoy the good company of one another," said Father Tom Brooks, the parish priest.

Events include the Anniversary Cash Bash, a fundraiser where games, raffles, food, and beverages will be available. Two televisions will be given away to two lucky parishioners, in honor of the two anniversaries being celebrated. The church is also planning to collect canned goods for the needy. The goal is 250 cans, a representation of the 150- and 100-year anniversaries. Celebrations will take place all year long to honor the dual anniversaries.

"During Lent, for example, we'll be having three consecutive evenings of recollection centered on thanking God for the gifts of the past, rejoicing in our present, and looking forward to the future," said Father Tom Brooks.
